


CLUB TRAVEL

ECUADOR AND THE GALÁPAGOS ISLANDS

On July 10th, 1997, our group of 17 flew via Madrid to Quito which at about 2,850m is the world's second highest capital. On our arrival we caught spectacular views of the Andes, in particular of Cotopaxi (5,897m.) the world's tallest active volcano. The mainland has three regions: the coastal lowlands, the Andean highlands and Amazonia. The Galápagos Islands, also part of the Republic of Ecuador, lie 1000km out in the Pacific. About 40% are indigenous Indians and the remainder mestizos (mixed race). Spanish is the main language, with English only rarely understood.

Although not the area's first conquerors, the Incas ruled until the Spanish arrived in 1526. After several attempts, independence was finally achieved in 1822 by Simón Bolívar. Civilian rule has alternated with military rule with the civilians presently in power. Despite a border dispute with Peru, Ecuador is peaceful and remains one of the safest countries to visit in South America.

In 1978 UNESCO declared the centre of Quito, with its many colonial buildings and plazas, a world cultural heritage site. Chief among the architectural attractions is the 16th century Monastery of San Francisco, Ecuador's oldest church. Its whispering gallery, designed to facilitate the hearing at a safe distance of a contagious penitent's confessions, provided our group with the means for some rather more secular exchanges. Visible from everywhere in the old town is *El Panecillo* (little loaf of bread) and its enormous statue of the Virgin of Quito.

Our first hike was up the nearby 3600m Ungui. Taxis brought us to the start of the hike and we walked unguided to the top, past cultivated fields at improbable angles. Below us the city looked peaceful, with distant Cotopaxi sharply visible. Next day Freddy's 4WD jeeps brought us to 4000m to start the trek up Rucu Pichincha. On this more strenuous climb Freddy kept us moving slowly but steadily towards the 4700m peak. Several turned back with headaches and stomach upsets, but most managed to summit. On the decent I twisted my ankle, ending my hopes of climbing Cotopaxi or indeed anywhere else for a long time. When the time came, ten people attempted Cotopaxi and seven succeeded. The hike began after midnight, dawn arrived while they ascended, time at the top was short and the decent was rapid.

My ankle having recovered a little over a fortnight, I went on a 2 day river rafting expedition that took us almost to the coast. This was in the province of Esmeraldas, best known in Ireland as the temporary residence of a certain Episcopal exile.

A favourable climate has bestowed on Ecuador a biodiversity like few other places on earth and where better to observe it up close than the marvellous Galápagos Islands. Three of us flew there for a five day cruise around the archipelago. Uninhabited until relatively recent times, its unique wildlife has little fear of man. Inquisitive sea lions, on the beaches and in the sea, approach in a friendly (you hope) manner. As you walk around blue-footed boobies, iguanas ignore you and mocking birds land on your feet as you sunbathe. The scenery has its own barren beauty but creatures such as the giant tortoises and turtles make it a paradise for natural-history enthusiasts. Its most famous visitor, Charles Darwin, spent 5 weeks there in 1835 collecting evidence for his theory of evolution. A visit is expensive, costing about £600 ex Quito, all included.

An excellent guide to the country is the Lonely Planet travel survival kit *Ecuador and the Galápagos Islands*.

Our trip was organised by Herbert Herzmann, who is based in Dublin. He is planning another trip from 15DEC to 31DEC of this year. He is also planning a trekking and hiking trip to Chile for March 1999. The Christmas trip to Ecuador costs £1,650 which includes flights, all transfers, B&B and a 5-day guided hike along the *Condor Trek*, etc. Anyone interested should book immediately.
